 The artist has control by including everyday objects as the main interest


Lighting can emphasise form or shape

Symbolism.


Use objects to depict subjects such as youth, old age, memories, fear etc.









Combination of different fruits or vegetables, peel, cut, let them go bad. Add a background cloth.






A bouquet, a single bloom, colour, texture, a close up view, an interesting background.

A still life incorporated into a landscape to make a comment.











Vanitas
Objects that show a passing of time, in someone's life, historical event, family celebration.



Covered objects or objects placed into a transparent container. Wrapped, folded, screwed up, torn open.











Manipulation in Photoshop
